SOME CAREER HIGHLIGHTS: 1973-80

- Solidified Anthropology curriculum at new unit of the University of Alaska in Anchorage beginning 1973, faculty advisor to first Student Anthropology Club, built cooperative bridges to Anchorage Community College Anthropology program
- Wrote letter to President of the University of Alaska notifying him that UA,A was perceived locally as solely a community college and that changes needed to be made; President Hiatt ordered a survey, confirming my allegations and UA,A administration was instructed to change the perception and reality of our campus
- Initiated and co-developed first statewide Anthropology conference, 1974, out of which came the Alaska Anthropology Association (aaa) -- continuous conferences and Association since then, and the Association now has its own *Alaska Journal of Anthropology*; served on first advisory board of the aaa
- Received, with students enrolled in anthropology research methods courses, the first two National Science Foundation (NSF) grant awards (Student Originated Studies Program [SOS] of NSF) at the new University of Alaska, Anchorage (1978, '80) to study Alaska Youth Living Away From Home (focus on Alaska Native youth) and the Needs of Urban Based Alaska Native Elderly. Several student researchers continued graduate studies elsewhere at Master's and Doctoral levels. Outstanding Student award in the NSF SOS program, 1980 (a 50 year old Yupik woman who was part of the student research team on the elderly Alaska Native study)
- Originated peer review by faculty for annual reviews, tenure, promotion at the Senior College of UA,A as Head of the Division of Behavioral Sciences (1974-'76)
- Established the still on-going Behavioral Sciences in the North conference as head of planning for the first conferences, 1974, '75, '76 (psychology, sociology, social work and anthropology), bringing local and statewide community leaders and politicians to the campus for engaged discussions of social issues facing the state
- Co-authored first engaged learning grant at UA,A – through the University Year for ACTION Program, US Department of Health, Education and Welfare, \$100,000, 1975 (three year project)
- Played leadership role, with colleagues, in establishing the principle of faculty governance at UA,A, 1974-'80 (University Assembly, Faculty Senate)
- Conducted the first socio-cultural impact research of an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) related to oil exploration in Alaska (1975) for the Department of Interior, Outer Continental Shelf office;

offered testimony on behalf of State of Alaska governor's lawsuit to slow down oil leases in SE Alaska until better environmental safeguards were established; the OCS had altered my report, changing my estimates of high impacts to low impacts; resulted in the OCS establishment of a qualified socio-cultural research officer for future oil exploration and development in Alaska to avoid future litigation
